

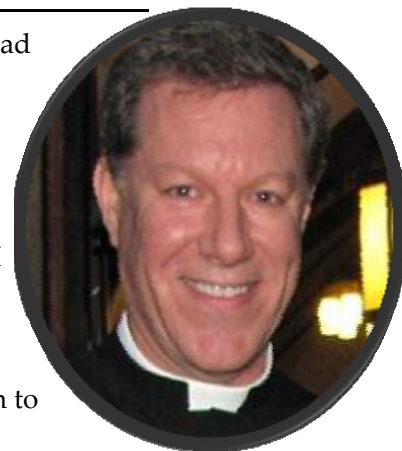

From Fr. Michael

Christ Episcopal Church, Red Wing, Minnesota! Had you asked me a year ago where the search process would lead me, I don't imagine that I would have guessed anywhere near the Upper Midwest; but life is full of wonderful twists and turns, and one often discovers that what seems to be the logical path to follow is not at all what God intends. How pleased I am that Canon Olson called me in September to ask if I would consider serving a wonderful church in Minnesota that was looking for a new priest. Little then did I realize that this was to be my introduction to the new path that God was leading me along!



Looking back on the process now, I shouldn't have been so surprised by this unexpected development, because in my head I had already created a list of bullet points to guide me in my search for a new ministry; one that suggested a town and a church very much like CEC Red Wing:

A charming small town environment with a bustling core and an Episcopal church in the middle of it all.

A vibrant local arts scene *and* proximity to a major metropolitan area with world class cultural institutions.

A beautiful, historic church building.

A liturgical tradition that was recognizably Anglican and grounded in the Book of Common Prayer but also open to the occasional use of new liturgical sources.

A musical life that was rich and ripe for further expansion.

An open, inclusive congregation that valued hospitality and welcomed diversity.

When I look at this list now, to all of the above I say, "Check!" All of these qualities are present in this church and in this community. I may not have realized that I was looking for Christ Church all along, but I now believe that I was!

It has been a pleasure to be with all of you these past two months, and I am thrilled to think of what our future together might hold. But before I begin dreaming, I have to thank the search committee, the vestry, the diocesan consultants, and all of those who were involved in creating the discovery document. The hard work of this large group of concerned parishioners and diocesan support staff ensured that Christ

Mark your calendar for the world Day of Prayer sponsored by Church women United. This year the focus is on Malaysia with the theme "Let Justice Prevail."

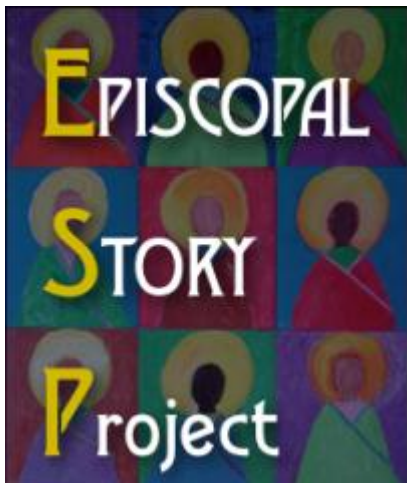

Lenten Services and Changes in Sunday Ministries

My March “Caller” article will be devoted to Lenten themes, but Ash Wednesday and the First Sunday in Lent fall within February this year, so a brief mention here of our service plans for this Lent is necessary. As an opportunity to explore different Lenten disciplines, I would like to invite the community to join us, Monday through Friday, in an observation of the Morning and Evening Offices, beginning on Thursday following Ash Wednesday and continuing throughout the season up to the last Friday in Lent (March 30). Each day during the week we will meet for Morning Prayer at

8 a.m. and Evening Prayer at 6:30 p.m. There will be variety in how we observe the offices; for example, sometimes we will chant the service, sometimes it will all be spoken. There will even be Taizé music used occasionally, and other times when we may sing a traditional hymn. You may pick and choose which services you attend – some may wish to make a regular attendance at one of the offices a regular discipline for the season, others may wish to come only once – both are fine (as is everything in between). We want to offer you these opportunities to help you seek a Holy and Meaningful Lent: a time for self-examination and spiritual exploration as you seek to find a more prominent place for God in your life.

Changes for the Readers and Chalice Bearers assigned for the 10 a.m. Service:

Beginning on February 26, the two readers normally assigned for Sunday lessons will have different responsibilities. One reader will be responsible for both the Old Testament reading *and* the reading from the Epistle and will lead the congregation in the Psalm appointed for the day. The second person (formerly the second “reader”) will be the intercessor for the day and will lead the congregation in the Prayers of the People.

The Chalice Bearers will vest for the services, process with the altar party at the beginning of the service and sit or stand in the Chancel throughout the service. This will help us to maintain a more formal, dignified appearance in our services. Please arrive early enough to vest prior to the opening procession.

Forgiveness

"If you have a grievance against anyone, forgive him, so that your Father in heaven may also forgive you your offenses. Mark 11:26

Too often we think of forgiving as something we do for others. But in reality, we do it for ourselves. Holding on to grievances hurts us far more than the person we are not forgiving. It is another of those stress chemical things! Our forgiveness from God depends on our forgiving "those who trespass against us."



We not only can receive forgiveness from God and neighbor, but also from our bodies. When our bodies have been mistreated by poor eating habits, lack of exercise, smoking, or other less than optimum choices, it will forgive us if we repent and amend our ways. After

stopping smoking for a number of years—the exact number depends on who you ask—lungs show no signs of damage and are no more likely to develop lung cancer than those who never smoked. Weight can be lost if we have over-indulged and gained if someone is cured from an eating disorder. Muscle can be built up; flexibility and stamina can be increased. Cholesterol levels can be reduced, blood pressure reduced, and blood sugar stabilized by life style changes.

Exercise plays a role in this amendment of life process. Receiving forgiveness usually is the result of changing behavior. If your neighbor forgives you for keeping him up with a loud riotous party, and if you continue to have such parties, you may find the police at your door. When we ask God for forgiveness, we also promise to try very hard to do better in the future. When we ask our bodies to forgive us, this forgiveness also comes with the necessity for improvement. Our body, unlike God and our neighbor, is unwilling to forgive based on promises and sorry alone. We can't say, "Look, body. I need to lose five pounds by this weekend, and once the party is over, I will go on a diet." The body wants to see a change of behavior up front. Have you done enough so that your body is forgiving you?

Did You Know?

On February 18, the church honors Martin Luther.

Martin Luther was born on November 10, 1483. His intellectual abilities were evident early, and his father planned a career for him in law. Luther's real interest lay elsewhere, however, and in 1505, he entered the local Augustinian monastery. He was ordained a priest April 3, 1507.

In October 1512, Luther received his doctorate in theology, and shortly afterward he was installed as a professor of biblical studies at the University of Wittenberg. His lectures on the Bible were popular, and within a few years he made the university a center for biblical humanism. As a result of his theological and biblical studies he called into question the practice of selling indulgences. On the eve of All Saints' Day, October 31, 1517, he posted on the door of the castle in Wittenberg the notice of an academic debate on indulgences, listing 95 theses for discussion. As the effects of the theses became evident, the Pope called upon the Augustinian order to discipline their member. After a series of meetings, political maneuvers, and attempts at reconciliation. Luther at a meeting with the papal legate in 1518, refused to recant.

Luther was excommunicated on January 3, 1521. The Emperor Charles V summoned him to the meeting of the Imperial Diet at Worms. There Luther resisted all efforts to make him recant, insisting that he had to be proved in error on the basis of Scripture. The Diet passed an edict calling for the arrest of Luther. Luther's own prince, the Elector Frederick of Saxony, however, had him spirited away and placed for safekeeping in his castle, the Wartburg.

Here Luther translated the New Testament into German and began the translation of the Old Testament. He then turned his attention to the organization of worship and education. He introduced congregational singing of hymns, composing many himself, and issued model orders of services. He published his large and small catechisms for instruction in the faith. During the years from 1522 to his death, Luther wrote a prodigious quantity of books, letters, sermons and tracts. Luther died on February 18, 1546.

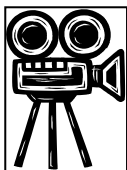

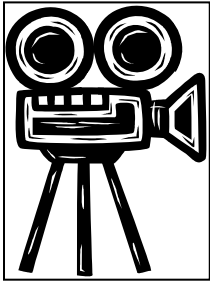
